

Idiom: to be as right as rain

Meaning: to be perfectly fine

Example: Take some medicine, go to bed and in the morning you'll be as right as rain, you'll see.



IDIOM:

TO BE SNOWED UNDER

MEANING: TO HAVE TOO MUCH WORK

**EXAMPLE: I'VE BEEN SNOWED UNDER
RECENTLY, I NEED HOLIDAYS!**

Idiom: to drive someone nuts

Meaning: to annoy or irritate

Example: My brother is driving me nuts!





Idiom: to go bananas



Meaning: to become angry



**Example: If you don't clean your room,
your mum will go bananas!**

Idiom: to have a whale of a time

Meaning: to have a great time

**Example: I hope you have a whale of a time
on your trip to Amsterdam!**

Idiom: to have an ace up your sleeve

Meaning: to have a secret skill, plan or knowledge



Example: I knew I would be successful with the negotiations because I had an ace up my sleeve.

Idiom: to have one's back to the wall

Meaning: to be in a very difficult situation

Example: With my back to the wall I had to sign the contract, I had no other option.



Idiom: to have snow on the mountain

Meaning: to have grey hair

Example: My grandpa has a bit of snow on the mountain because he's old.



Idiom: to have time on your hands



**Meaning: to have a lot of free time,
even more than one needs**

**Example: You don't need to hurry,
we have time on our hands.**

Idiom: to kill two birds with one stone



**Meaning: to achieve two
things in a single action**



**Example: While learning Maths I
prepared dinner, I killed two birds
with one stone!**
